
The Circuit Guide contains information for your trip to Melbourne.

# ALBERT PARK STREET CIRCUIT




The Albert Park Street Circuit is 5,303 meters long is located on public roads, located in Albert Park. The track is mostly flat and features sixteen corners, some of which are very fast. The track was often heavily criticized – overtaking was far from common on the relatively narrow street circuit. Where the track was wider, the braking zones were bumpy. Therefore, in recent years many changes have been made to the circuit.

Among other things, the pit lane has been widened. This way, drivers can drive through the pits faster. This should make pit stops more attractive and create more interesting strategies. Furthermore, the track has been resurfaced and seven corners have been modified. The goal was more overtaking opportunities and higher speed.

#### **How To Get There?**

The easiest way to buy to Albert Park is by streetcar. It goes every few minutes and is free during race weekend to get to the track.

You can also easily get to the track by cab or Uber. Cab ranks are located next to entrances 1 and 2 on Canterbury Road, entrances 3 and 4 on Albert Road, entrance 8 on St Kilda Road and entrance 10 on Fitzroy Street.


### **Opening Hours**

The track opens its doors at the following times during the GP weekend:

- Thursday at 9:30 a.m.
- Friday at 8:30 a.m.
- Saturday at 9:00 a.m.
- Sunday at 8:30 a.m.

### **Walking Distance**

Attending a Grand Prix usually entails a considerable amount of walking. It is essential to wear comfortable shoes that can withstand the walking demands, along with comfortable clothing.

#### **Food and Drinks**

Several food and drink stands can be found throughout the circuit. You may also bring your own food to the track, but it must be properly wrapped in plastic. Non-alcoholic drinks may be brought in plastic bottles, provided they have not been previously opened.

### **Sanitary Facilities**

Restrooms are located throughout the track. Pay attention to the signs directing you to the nearest restroom. At many Grand Prix circuits, the majority of toilets are temporary facilities set up specifically for the race weekend. While they are designed to meet sanitation standards and offer basic amenities, their temporary nature might mean variations in size, capacity, or comfort compared to permanent facilities.

# **Taking Pictures**

Photography is permitted; however, it is restricted to the use of simple cameras. It's important to be mindful of obstructing the view of fellow spectators. Everyone should ensure that their enjoyment does not disrupt others, so we encourage spectators to always be considerate of those around them

- Sun protection;
- Sturdy walking shoes;
- Hearing protection;
- Photo camera incl. extra battery and memory card;
- Your printed ticket.

### Climate

The race is scheduled to take place in Melbourne in late March. During this time, you can expect a pleasant temperature averaging around 21°C during the day. While there is typically minimal precipitation, it's advisable to be prepared for any rain showers, just to be on the safe side.

### **Circuit Access Criteria**

In case you are wondering whether something is allowed to bring or not, please refer to the list below. All unauthorized items must be dropped off at the circuit entrance gates. Circuit staff have the right to add other items to the list.

- Aerosol cans (deodorant, mosquito repellent, etc.).
- Alcoholic beverages
- Bags or backpacks larger than 15 liters; Luggage and trolley;
- Chairs and stools.
- Cans, metal and glass bottles;
- Dangerous items;
- Drugs;
- Electronic cigars/cigarettes;
- Fireworks, smoke bombs, rockets, laser pointers, stadium horns;
- Flagpoles and umbrellas;
- Harmful and flammable substances:
- Mirror reflex cameras or video cameras;
- (Domestic) animals;
- Powerbanks;
- Tents and sleeping bags;
- Vehicles (bicycles, scooters, etc.).
